Women's Health Matters champions freedom for disadvantaged women and girls so they may have a fair chance at a better life.

We work intensively with around 750 women each year in and around Leeds. These women are most at risk, including those experiencing domestic violence, sexual and emotional abuse, those with children in care or at risk of being removed, young mums, women seeking asylum, women with learning difficulties, and women with complex needs or mental health and wellbeing needs. We take a woman-centred holistic approach, creating a safe, nurturing environment to help women recover their confidence, explore their own needs, and regain control over their lives.

We are looking for an experienced and motivated member of staff* to join our new, National Lottery Community Fund project, Breathe Free for 21 hours per week. The project aims to support women aged 16 and above who've experienced complex trauma, usually domestic abuse, and are at risk of having a child removed into care as a result. The purpose of the role is to develop and provide group facilitation, structured programmes, and 1 to 1 support to women. Some of these women will work with us to coproduce and deliver resources to support best practice. There are an optional 7 hours per week to work on other projects.
